Letter from Pastor Rod

Lent 2025

This Lent we celebrate a church that lives out the fundamental idea that as God's beloved people, we are always discerning, always reforming, always leaning into what it means to be the people of God in each unique time and place.



The opening confession of the Book of Hebrews states: Long ago God spoke to our ancestors in many and various ways by the prophets, 2but

in these last days he has spoken to us by a Son,* whom he appointed heir of all things, through whom he also created the worlds. 3He is the reflection of God's glory and the exact imprint of God's very being, and he sustains* all things by his powerful word.

The Living Catechism is a project flowing from St. Olaf Colleges' Lutheran Center and Church Anew and it asks, "how do we articulate the core understandings of a Lutheran perspective and take seriously the complex realities of life today." Martin Luther was responsive to the particularities of life in his time, while seeking to be faithful to the Christian Scriptures. A Living Catechism seeks to do the same in our time – to be faithful to the Christian Scriptures and be responsive to the unique realities of our time and place.

The 7 Principles of A Living Catechism include:

God becomes human for us in Jesus Christ. John 1:1-5 God meets us in bread, wine, and water. Luke 22:14-20 God feels our pain and suffering. 2 Corinthians. 1:3-4 God delights in our goodness & judges sin. Genesis

1:1-2:2

God speaks to us through Scripture and Spirit. Hebrews

God compels creation toward mercy. Luke 15:11-32

God loves us eternally. Revelation. 21:1-5

Each week during Lent we will explore one of these seven principles in connection with scripture, discovering anew how God's word speaks to us in our day, calling the church in our era to discernment, reformation, and to lean into what it means to be the people of God in our time and place.

The faith we share is passed down from generation to generation - it's an unbroken line of ancestry that connects us all the way back to Jesus. The powers of the world wanted to break Jesus and yet this faith that we rest on is strong enough that they couldn't do it. We are a part of this great tradition that will not and cannot be broken. Worship with us Sundays and Wednesdays as we explore and renew the gift of faith through God's word.

In Like a Lamb; out like a _

Have you ever heard the saying, "In like a lamb; out like a lion!"? This saying is an old wives tale meaning that if the first day of March is warm and sunny (sweet like a lamb), then the last days of March will be cold and bitter (angry like a lion). It's not always true.

The church begins our celebration of Lent in March. Lent is a time when the church focuses of Jesus as he makes his journey to the cross. As I think about Jesus' journey, it makes me think about this saying, In like a lamb; out like a lion! But it doesn't quite fit.

Jesus is like a lamb. Isaiah 53:7 states, like a lamb that is led to the slaughter, and like a sheep that before its shearers is silent, so he did not open his mouth." In other words, Jesus did not protest or fight back when sinners mistreated him and crucified him. Instead, he went to the cross willingly to save us. He went in like a lamb.

But when Jesus was raised three days later, he did not come out like a lion. A lion would have torn to shreds those who had hurt him; those who had betrayed and denied him, and those who had abandoned him. Instead, Jesus came out like a shepherd. He came out of the grave in great love and began to gather his flock. He met Mary and Peter, and James and John and so many others and he loved them and forgave them; gathered and fed them.

In like a lamb, out like a shepherd! Jesus goes in like a lamb - the lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world – and he came out like a shepherd – a shepherd who gathers, protects, and feeds his flock.

"Thank you," Jesus, "for loving us enough to forgive us, gather us, and save us. Thank you for being our lamb and our shepherd." Amen.

Unbroken Devotion



It seems so late this year, and that's probably because it's pretty close to the latest it can be, but Lent is finally here. I've said it before and I'll say it again, this is one of my favorite times of the year. 40 days to wander, 40 days to grow, 40 days to listen to God, and 40 days of so much more. This year the theme is Unbroken: A Living faith. We are using a Lenten theme that was put together by Church Anew, and it provides a

lot of resources for us to use. One such resource is a Lenten Devotional. The devotional this year looks at some Spiritual Practices and Reflections. 40 Days to practice and reflect. There are two ways in which you can participate again this year. You can join the Immanuel Facebook Group which will have the devotions online with an opportunity to talk to one another and reflect with a larger group. The other option is for you to pick up the devotional in the church office and you can read along at your own pace.

But what exactly is this series going to be like. Great question, thank you for asking. Here is a little explanation by Ellie Roscher and Joe Davis who created this year's devotion. Each week there will be a video, 5 days of devotion, and a day of reflection. Here is a sample of one of the devotions:

God is speaking to you through whispers and wails, through the wind and the waves, through strangers and loved ones. Lent is a beautiful time to quiet ourselves and listen. Begin your spiritual practice today with intentional listening. Find a comfortable place to sit and create a shape with your body that is alert and calm. Take some light movement, maybe rocking, swaying, or taking some slow neck rolls or shoulder circles. Then move toward stillness, eventually shutting your eyes or taking a soft gaze inward. Listen to the sounds in the room. Then listen to the sound of your breath, noticing the cadence of your inhales and exhales. Then allow your exhales to bring your awareness into your body and for several moments listen to what your body is communicating to you. Today, notice how God is speaking to you through stories. We are swimming in stories that are rich and offer meaning. Stories remind us of where we came from and how we are interconnected. They can present messy, beautiful truth in a way that facts do not. They bring us back to ourselves and hold us in the web of creation, including our ancestors and descendants. Choose a story, biblical or not. Don't overthink your choice, just notice what story rises to the surface. The stories that are important to you have accompanied you for a reason. If none come to mind, think of a picture book you loved as a child. Ask, "God who speaks through story, what truth are you inviting me to remember today?" Ponder the story anew. If you have the time, read the story with an open mind and heart. If not, simply reflect on the story you hold and notice what parts of the story are shimmering with God's voice. What good news might the story carry for you today?

I pray you consider taking some time this Lent to join me on another Lenten journey as we grow together in Christ who is with us on the journey.

The Board of Trustees met on February 10, 2025 at the church and by Zoom. January 2025 Income was \$40,281.50 and expenses were \$51,745.31 with a negative (\$11,463.81) for the month of January. 2024 was (-\$7,695.37)

Endowment: \$54,000 was allowed for disbursement in 2024 and \$68,000 will be allowed in 2025. No new requests were submitted

Property Committee: Tim Severson continues the insulation of water lines in the boiler room, changing out burned light bulbs replacing with LED, and looked at the Parsonage oven replacement options.

Personnel Committee: Policy 1120 Grievance procedure and Policy 1145 Inclement weather was updated. Policy 1125 was also restructured. Board approved for council final approval.

New Business: Looking at Directional signage to Immanual for out-of-town entrance.

Call to Order: The meeting was called to order by President Kathy McEnelly at 6:30pm. Devotions were shared by Ben Arentson.

Old Business: Pastor Zech would like to be gone on his sabbatical May 12-August 3rd. Jen moved to approve the sabbatical, with a second by Keith. Motion carried. Policies 1120 (Staff Grievance Procedures), 1125 (Restructuring of Staff), and policy 1145 (Inclement Weather Policy) were reworked by the Board of Trustees. All three policies were cleaned up; there are no major changes outside of wordsmithing and streamlining the wordiness of the policies. Board of Trustees brought the motion to Council to approve during the consent agenda.

New Business: Kathy clarified her expectations for Council meetings and presented the Congregational Leadership Council document to all members.

Pastor Jeniffer will be installed on 2/16/25, followed by a meet and greet coffee hour.

Council discussed RAGBRAI coming to town. A planning committee will be established, following a vote by Council. Pastor Rod discussed his and Kathy's retreat to learn more on Reconciling in Christ (RIC) on 2/8/25.

Steve discussed small groups with Council. Small Groups have gone on for a year—three groups currently exist. There is a young people group meeting regularly, a community service-

oriented group, and a bible study group. A video is being put together with testimonials of those participating in the groups to inform the congregation of the opportunities. Also, an insert will be included in the bulletin to collect more names of those interested.

An update was given by Pastor Rod regarding the Parish Nurse. We have a qualified candidate that interviewed within the last 2 weeks that has an RN and is expecting to finish her BSN in June. The personnel committee brought a motion forward to hire this candidate; a second was offered by Keith. Motion carried. A custodian was hired—Scott Leber. He is doing a great job. Ben asked for volunteers to fill in as secretary. Marla will be backup and Jen will be second backup.

Keith asked if we could bump the next council meeting to the 17th of March due to spring break.

Business Financials: Income for January was \$40,281.50, with expenditures of \$51,745.31, resulting in a net negative of \$11,463.81 for January.

Upcoming Events: Next Council Meeting is March 17th Closing Prayer offered by Ben. Meeting Adjourned by Kathy at 8:00 PM.

The Story


