

Letter from Pastor Rod

Unbroken and Unbreakable

You may have heard the phrase, break it; you buy it." Growing up three brothers there were plenty broken items caused by our rambunctiousness. My mom said more than once, just can't have anything nice in this house." Of course, those moments, we brothers always blamed each other. "Yes, I into it, but you pushed me!"

It's easy to see we live in broken world. People get broken by the circumstances of life all

the time. Wars, famine, family conflict, illness all add up to assaults on the life God has given. This is exactly what the Apostle Paul is talking about in Romans 8 when right in the middle of a beautiful proclamation that nothing will be able to separate us from the love of Christ he writes:

'For your sake we are being killed all day long; we are accounted as sheep to be slaughtered.'

Paul is acknowledging that he and his fellow missionaries are being beaten up, assaulted, and broken by the circumstances of the life they have been called into as followers of Jesus. Still, despite this reality, Paul concludes this to the question, "Who will separate us from the love of Christ?" No, in all these things [assaults] we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. 38For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, 39nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord. (Romans 8:35-39)

The cross is the crescendo of God's love for God's creation. It is the moment when God says, "I will not let evil, violence, suffering, hunger, hardship, struggle, illness, inhumanity or anything in this world break you. I will be broken to hold you and all things together."

Easter is therefore a proclamation and a declaration that we, as creatures and the creation of God are unbroken and unbreakable. Sin, evil, and the forces that oppose God will do its best, but the empty tomb tells the real story: In Christ's rising from the dead, we too have victory in him and are held together – unbroken and unbreakable – by his love. God is not and will not sell us out, give up on us, or turn away. God continues to lead us toward the abundant life found only in the one who overcame death and the grave – Jesus Christ our Lord. Christ is risen, indeed! Alleluia!

When someone raises their hand to their forehead and makes the letter "L" with their hand, they are typically telling the person on the other end of that gesture that they are a

looser. It isn't a kind thing to do.

Now look at the cross. Can you see that where the cross beams intersect there are four "Ls" One is right-side up; one is upside down; one is upside down and backwards; and one is upside down and forward. This "L" in the cross can't mean looser because Jesus is the victor over the power of the cross. It must mean "LOVE." It symbolizes God's love for you and me and all of creation: a love that is right-side up, upside down, forward and backwards. God loves you every day, in every way, and in every direction. God loves you more than you can ever imagine.

Endowment Fund Continues Growth

Immanuel's Endowment Fund had another good year in 2024. The fund was up 21.6% for the year and total value was nearly \$1.5 million as of December 31, 2024. Returns have topped 20% for four of the past six years with only one down year (minus 14% in 2022).

The Immanuel Lutheran Endowment Fund & Memorial Trust was established in 1985 as a financial resource in the event of unforeseen emergencies. Directors of the fund may distribute income from the fund for such things as capital improvements/building expansion; religious, educational and charitable work; and contributions to the programs of the ELCA.

The Endowment Fund provides approximately 5% of the value of the fund (as of September 30) to the church's general fund for the following calendar year. At their October 2024 meeting, directors voted to provide \$68,000 to the general fund to be used in 2025 in accordance with the Endowment bylaws.

Since 2012 when the value of the fund was just over \$500,000, the Endowment Fund has received nearly \$240,000 in donations while contributing \$432,772 to the general fund.

Current directors are David Damm (chair), Steve Westerberg (vicechair), Mark Johnson (treasurer), Jen Jenkins (secretary), Cindi Lehmann, Kathy Leuwerke and Keith Walker. Pastor Rod Hopp and Kim Severson (business administrator) also attend the quarterly meetings.

The Endowment Fund is currently invested 86 percent in a stock index fund, 9 percent in fixed income (bonds and CDs) and 5 percent in cash (money market fund). The CDs are purchased through the Mission Investment Fund of the ELCA. The Mission Investment Fund provides low-interest loans to established ELCA congregations, new-start congregations and ELCA-related ministries.

If you would like to donate to Immanuel's Endowment Fund, there are several ways to do so:

- Designate current gifts to the Endowment Fund. We ask that this is in addition to your regular church giving, as to not reduce annual giving to Immanuel.
- 2. Include the Endowment Fund in your will or other legacy planning. Make sure to designate the Immanuel Lutheran (Forest City, Iowa) Endowment Fund as the recipient of your gift.
- 3. Do a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD). Anyone

I hope this Holy Week season you'll listen to the words that you sing in worship, and be moved by the Good News of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, in scripture and song. Because it's awesome music. years of age or older can donate a portion of a traditional IRA to Immanuel's Endowment Fund, including money from a Required Minimum Distribution (RMD), up to \$100,000 per year. Your IRA administer should have a special QCD form allowing you to donate money from your traditional IRA directly to Immanuel's Endowment Fund. That way, the donation goes DIRECTLY to Immanuel and no tax is owed by the person giving the donation. Note that a QCD gift in NOT deductible as a charitable contribution on Schedule A. For more information on QCDs, see Publication 590-B at IRS.gov or speak with your tax planning professional.

seeing polar bears on the snowy Canadian tundra. But when one bear gets way too close for comfort, do the boys have any chance of surviving?


